An Experience in Ecuador

I enjoyed a month-long internship in January 2014 at the Centro Ecuatoriano Norteamericano (CEN) de Guayaquil. Who wouldn't enjoy January in a place of perpetual summer? And, besides that, the motivated, well-educated students and the welcoming atmosphere of CEN are ideal for helping a beginning teacher to gain experience and confidence. The curriculum is well designed, as we should expect since they used UMBC faculty Ron Schwartz and John Nelson as consultants for it. There are plenty of things to do when not working: CEN hosts cultural events; the beach is two

hours from Guayaquil; and the city of Guayaquil full of entertainment. If you go, CEN can help find accommodations; if you want to learn some Spanish, ask them to place you with a family that does not speak English.

The History and State of the ESOL Program

I thought that this second edition of the ESOL/Bilingual News might be a good opportunity to write a brief article on the ESOL Program itself. The program was first established by Ron Schwartz in 1979. He directed the program until he retired in 2004. Throughout its 34 year history, it has enjoyed a good reputation in



the ESOL field and enjoyed a healthy enrollment of largely Master's Degree students. In the 1990s when the Maryland State Department of Education decided to have ESOL Certification, the state requirements were largely patterned after UMBC's program ESOL MA requirements. The Resource Center for Language and Culture (RCLC) was also established in the 1990's and its collection grew steadily through the early years of this century. Our Post-Baccalaureate ESOL Certificate came into being in 2005. This is also when the program began development of the online courses that it currently offers. While it is possible to earn our ESOL MA degree completely with online courses, we are continuing to develop online courses to meet the need. The program offered the first cohort program with

Baltimore County Public Schools in 2006. Our ESOL club began in 2010, and has been active ever since.

Currently, the program has 126 students. 60, or roughly half of these are MA students. Most of these students are studying the regular MA option, but some are choosing the Certification option, and a few are writing theses. 28 more are Certificate students; 13 are non-degree students; and 25 are cohort students. 28 students are taking classes exclusively online, while most of the other students take a combination of online and face-to-face classes. The program appears to be sustaining its strong reputation in the ESOL field, both locally and internationally, while enjoying a healthy enrollment.

Karen Dellinger 2011 MA TESOL


